



Toshio Koike is the executive director of the International Centre for Water Hazard and Risk Management (ICHARM) under the auspices of UNESCO and a professor emeritus of the University of Tokyo. He has been the chair of the River Council of Japan since 2015, leading discussions on important river-related matters to advise the Minister of Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism of Japan. In his capacity as a council member of the Science Council of Japan under the Cabinet Office since 2017, he has contributed to addressing various issues through science by making policy and other recommendations to the private and public sectors nationwide. After earning a bachelor, master's, and doctoral degree in Engineering in 1980, 1982, and 1985, respectively, from the University of Tokyo, he served as a research associate in 1985 and a lecturer from 1986 to 1987 there. Then, he was at the Nagaoka University of Technology, Japan, as an associate professor from 1988 to 1999 and a professor in 1999. In the same year, he returned to the Department of Civil Engineering, the University of Tokyo, and served as a professor until 2017. He has been the director of ICHARM since 2014. In 2019, he received the International Scientific Cooperation Award from the Chinese Academy of Sciences and the Friendship Award from the Chinese government, also he won the 2020 GEO (Group on Earth Observations) Individual Excellence Award and received the International Lifetime Contribution Award of Japan Society of Civil Engineering (JSCE) in 2021 and the American Geophysical Union (AGU) Ambassador Award in 2022.
