



Angie Warren-Clark is a New Zealand Parliamentarian based in the Bay of Plenty. Angie has lived in Pāpāmoa which is in the Bay of Plenty region of the North Island of New Zealand for the past 15 years. She entered Parliament as a Labour list MP in 2017 and was re-elected in 2020.

Before becoming an MP, Angie was working to reduce family violence, beginning with volunteer work in 1990, before progressing to working as a Domestic Violence Advisor for the Ministry of Justice. She then became the Manager of Tauranga Women's Refuge, resulting in 15 years' experience in the sector. She brings a strong background of advocacy, community networking, and community service to her role in Parliament.

Angie has worked hard on initiatives to reduce food waste, protect the environment, and improve access to food for vulnerable communities. Her work resulted in a \$32 million Government fund, supporting nationwide food distribution initiatives announced in Budget 2019. Recently Angie has had her members bill, Crimes (Child Exploitation Offences) Amendment Bill signed into law, this Bill looks to provide justice to those who have been affected by grooming, both online and in person.

Angie's roles within the New Zealand Parliament include being the Chair of the Social Services Select Committee where she has heard from the community on a range of issues and legislation topics such as children's rights, social housing, accessibility, charities, and sports and recreation. Angie is also member of the Environment select committee which has been looking at reducing the harm from single use plastic. The committee has been tasked with reforming the Natural and Built Environment legislation, which aims to promote the protection and enhancement of the natural and built environment, while providing for housing and preparing for the effects of climate change.

Passionate about a fair working environment for all, Angie is proud to be the Labour lead on the Parliamentary Culture committee. Access to medical and sexual health is, for Angie a right, and she is proud to Chair the New Zealand Parliamentarians Group on Population and Development, which focuses on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) within the Pacific Islands and New Zealand.
