# Bruised brides: 78% of child marriage victims face health risk due to assault

Nearly 78% of child marriage victims in Hyderabad and elsewhere in the districts develop serious health issues after marriage due to physical assault by their husbands and relatives, revealed a study. MV Foundation, a child rights organization, interviewed 46 girls who were married for the past two to three years and 26 girls whose marriages were annulled in Nalgonda, Rangareddy, Mahbubnagar and Hyderabad. Based on the interviews, the organisation released the study on Thursday. The study was conducted with girls, in the age group of 16-20 years. According to the study, 89% of the girls were subjected to physical assault by their husbands on a daily basis, while 71% of the girls faced physical violence after marriage from their in-laws. # **Easier EPF access for over 55s**

MALAYSIA: Those aged 55 to 60 will have easier access to their Employees Provident Fund (EPF) savings – and in smaller amounts – from January. The current policy only allows partial withdrawals of a minimum of RM2,000 once every 30 days. Those who opt for the monthly retirement scheme have to withdraw a minimum of RM250 a month. EPF chief executive officer Datuk Shahril Ridza Ridzuan said the new schemes are made possible thanks to the upgrades in the system. "Under the old (current) EPF scheme, there are a number of restrictions on technology in terms of processing. (Read More)

# Global Fund: Kenya secures \$380m to fight HIV/AIDS, Malaria, TB

GLOBAL: Kenya on Friday said that the country had secured 380 million dollars from the Global Fund to fight HIV/AIDs, Malaria and Tuberculosis that are leading cause of deaths in the East African Nation. Henry Rotich, Cabinet Secretary for National Treasury, lauded the new funding that would covers a three year period terming it a giant step towards elimination of HIV/AIDs, Malaria and Tuberculosis in Kenya. "With this new grant, we will continue to support prevention, diagnosis and treatment interventions for HIV, TB and Malaria," said Rotich. He added that the Global Fund had in the past approved 19 grants to Kenya worth 1 billion dollars since its inception in 2002. Kenya's ministry of health and partners in the civil society will utilise the new grant to implement a host of projects geared towards reducing deaths linked to HIV, Malaria and TB. (Read More)
